Reduce the Risk of In-Person Opiod Treatment



More than 10,000 patients visit opioid treatment programs each day for in-person administration of medication-assisted treatment (MAT).

Opioid abuse disorder patients may face greater risk for contracting COVID-19 virus than non-opioid users. Studies have found that opioids compromise immune function.

Reduce the Risk of Accidental Exposure



The FDA has approved three drugs for use in MAT: methadone, naloxone, and buprenorphine.

MAT medications are powerful and can be dangerous. 11,275 child buprenorphine exposures were reported to poison control centers between 2007 and 2016. Eleven of the children died.

Federal regulations require safe storage of take-home opioid treatment medications.

Indiana is sending opioid abuse disorder treatment medications home to patients to prevent unnecessary COVID-19 risks from in-person treatment programs.

Indiana is making safety a priority by securing these powerful medications in a Safer Lock Box. The boxes are paid for using state targeted response funds provided by the federal government.
